In Greek mythology, it is common for a sea monster to be referred to as Cetus. This term is fairly vague. Based on context clues, however, it seems likely that Cetus was some sort of serpent/dragon, shark, whale, or fish. The most famous instance of Cetus being used is when

Poseidon sent Cetus to devour Andromeda.
